SENIOR PASTOR COMMISSIONING

In early February, WVBC members welcomed and voted in Associate and Administrative Lead Pastor Tom Miles as the new Senior Pastor of Wood Village Baptist Church! He was commissioned at the Sunday service on March 14, 2021.

Having met Pastor Bill Ehmann while attending Western Seminary, the two developed a close mentoring relationship that eventually drew the aspiring student and minister to serve and worship at WVBC with his wife, Jennifer, and two daughters, Rachel and Bethany. Over the past 10 years, Pastor Tom has served our church family faithfully, with the first 2-plus years in lay leadership building up our Men' Ministries and Young Families Ministries. After that, he served for a year in the role of Pastor-in-Training, during which time he took on the added responsibility of establishing a more formalized and intentional ministry to our local Latino community. Over the past 6 1/2 years, he has served faithfully as our Associate Pastor, demonstrating persistent compassion, administration, energy and a passion for growing disciples of Christ.



During 2019 and 2020, Pastor Tom admirably handled increasing levels of responsibility and leadership, working closely with the Elder Board to develop teaching, administer care, and manage our ministries through the trials of staff departures and the Covid-19 pandemic. Of course. God has been in control throughout, and none of this was without His direction and purpose, which, in part, was to refine and burnish a new chief shepherd to lead His church at Wood Village.

Pastor Tom earned his Masters of Arts in Ministry and Leadership at Western Seminary in 2010, and was ordained as a Minister of the Gospel by WVBC in 2017. Prior to his professional ministry, Pastor Tom was a Mechanical Engineer, working in that field for nearly 27 years.

In addition to her active service to our church family

through the years, Jennifer was a professional dental hygienist for 34 years. But as Pastor Tom's responsibilities grew over the past couple years, Jennifer determined to retire from the profession in 2020 and dedicate even more of her time, gifts and energies to serving the WVBC family, for which we are so grateful!

We look ahead with great expectation to God's work amongst and within our church family and local community, building the light of Christ within us, reaching children, youth and adults with His good news of salvation and the calling to an eternal walk with Him. Pastor Tom is highly enthused, equipped and motivated to help shepherd us in this iournev.

Pastor Tom becomes the eighth Senior Pastor of God's 70-year-old church body at Wood Village, following our longest-tenured and greatly loved Pastor Bill Ehmann, who served for 35 years, 25 of them as Senior Pastor.

The Women's Retreat was originally planned for April 17-19, 2020. One year later, still not enough time had passed to safely gather together in tight quarters for the weekend.


