


# "Code-Breaking 101: Deciphering Biblical Apocalyptic"

Features of Apocalyptic:			
It is (mysterious)—It comes weirdly: secret, hidden revelation usually discovered by the human author only through a vision, a dream, or an angel-messenger Things, places, and creatures take on symbolic meanings			
Time is also divided into numerically significant periods  All events in human history are following one			
predetermined, unified plan from the creation and Fall to its future climax (the "eschaton").			
Apocalyptic literature focuses not on			
the here-and-now but on the future. This is seen in several ways.			
• The world is in such bad shape			
that it is beyond hope for reformation. Nothing less than a complete destruction and a new beginning will solve the world's problems.			
1. <b>Now</b> : a time of growing evil with suffering for the saints			
2. The <b>Future</b> : a completely different time period free from all evil			
• God's coming is "just around the corner."			
• Emphasis on Individuals are eternal.			
• Belief in Dan. 12; Rev. 19			
Unlike the other prophets of Israel, apocalyptic			
writers are concerned with ALL humanity, as well as angels, the earth,			
and the heavens.			
All the universe is caught up in a huge, inevitable			
"showdown."			
The world will not become godly through a gradual			
process of transformation but must be catastrophically annihilated and			
then re-created; see Rev. 19-22.			
Jesus, the "Son of Man," will triumph over all			
evil and establish the peaceful, eternal, universal kingdom of God.
